John Aubrey: An early archaeologist who linked Stonehenge to prehistoric times, and suggested it had been built by druids.




Denisovans: Extinct relatives of the modern human

- The period of prehistory in Britain generally refers to the time before written records began
- In the Stone Age, people began to settle into farming villages instead of moving from place to place
- In the Bronze Age, people started to ride and use horses
- In the Iron Age, iron replaced bronze as the main material for making tools and weapons.
- The Iron Age ended when the Romans invaded Britain in AD 43.

A stone-built Neolithic settlement, located in the Orkney region in Scotland. It is a cluster of eight houses, which

A hillfort during the Iron Age which is based in Cambridgeshire.


Glossary

Homo Sapiens	the human species of today

nomads	people who move from one place to another, instead of living in one place.
roundhouse	a circular house with a conical thatched roof built from the Bronze Age to Iron Age
settlement	a place where people establish a community
